AVAG Honored at Above and Beyond Awards Gala

The American Veterans Assistance Group (AVAG) was honored at Angel Light Academy's Above and Beyond Awards Gala on September 25, 2021. AVAG is a community of veterans within each manufactured housing community involved with the Veterans Affordable Housing Program. Their mission is to thank and reward veterans for their service. AVAG helps to support veterans by creating a safe and supportive living environment and a way to connect with one another. Partnerships with other veteran and community groups allow AVAG to reach more veterans in the community providing services and information on healthcare, training, education, and other services and resources.

During the pandemic, AVAG and its partners fed over 10,000 households and helped to provide them with events, informational seminars, movie nights, parties, dinners, recreation such as exercise classes and sports teams, food distribution programs, outreach programs, and resource referrals for employment career training, and benefits.

Mr. Richard Simonian, a veteran of the U.S. Army Special Forces Green Berets, created the non-profit organization AVAG to assist veterans with affordable housing, holiday meals, Continued on Page 2

ALA's History

The Angel Light Academy was founded 1995 to serve those with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. After serving over 600,000 children through Project Prevention, an abuse prevention program, founder Julia Wilmot wanted to give hope to those who had experienced some form of trauma.

ALA began serving those with PTSD by teaching them to use their innate leadership traits and to use a simple, effective problem-solving model. Creating simple, doable action plans helped those with PTSD take control of their lives, make positive change, and build hope for the future.

The first Youth Leadership Conference was held in 1998 in Arizona. Due to demand from volunteers and parents, the conference was moved to the Coachella Valley in 1999. The first conference, held in Indio, California served 30 children.

Each year ALA's conference serves more than 200 children. Demand for this high-quality program grows each year as schools and districts request programming and training.

Many children from the conference join the year-round Junior Leadership program. Junior Leaders meet every six weeks with well-trained volunteer facilitators for in-depth training in leadership skills including character traits, problem solving, communication, team building, and service. They also conduct a Music and Memory program to assist those with Alzheimer's and other memory diseases. \$\infty\$

Meet Angel Light Academy Founders, Julia and General Richard Wilmot

Julia Wilmot first founded Angel Light Academy in 1995 to assist those with PTSD by helping to draw out their innate leadership traits, learn to find solutions to their problems, and take action to change their lives. She brought with her thirty years of entrepreneurial business experience, and experience as a secondary school, special education, and college teacher, fundraiser and creator of highly successful prevention programs for children.

She developed, implemented and raised funds for Project Prevention, a program that reached over 600,000 youth in Arizona. This program served as a model for abuse prevention programs throughout the United States. In 2003, she was awarded Woman of the Year for her thirty years of community leadership and service in Arizona.

Julia is truly a dynamic angel on earth, with an untiring devotion to the betterment of mankind. She is a pioneer in combining the concepts of science, spirituality, philosophy and psychology to leadership, team building, problem solving, communication and community development.

General Richard Wilmot is a retired US Army Brigadier General who has been involved in leadership at the national level for many years. He has traveled extensively and visited more than 100 countries. He has lived abroad for many years and is well-versed in national and international affairs. His expertise puts him in high demand as a public speaker. He is also an author and has owned and operated think tanks focused on national concerns.

The General's extensive travel and experience on the national and international stage has given him a unique perspective on leadership. His focus is to help fill the void in leadership at the local, state, and national level by helping to train young leaders. \$\infty\$





Wishes Come True -A Scooter for Veteran

AVAG was able to gift an electric scooter to Vietnam Army veteran Gary Mountcastle. We heard he had been in and out of the LBVA and was having a hard time getting around.

AVAG was approached by the American Legion Newport Beach Post 291 Service Officer, Cory Vigil, who told us that he knew Ed Griganavicius who had a scooter to donate.

We picked it up with the help of our volunteer David Breunig and took it to our friends at AR Mobility. We bought a new battery and got it ready to give it to Gary. What a surprise for him when we showed up at his house! We asked him to come outside and see what we had for him. He lives in a mobile home park and sees people cruising by on their scooters. He had said he was envious and wished he had one.



About Gary Mouncastle

Gary Mountcastle was 21 years old in 1969 when he enlisted in the Army. He was sent to Vietnam from February 1970 to August 1971. He had honored his father's wish that he not to join the military until he was not living under his father's roof anymore. His father, John Mountcastle, was a POW in Germany in World War II, so

it's understandable that he didn't want his son to go through what he went through.

Gary, originally applied for two tours in Vietnam to be part of the Hilo Project. He was in the officer's program and everything started off good. He was sent to basic training in Fort Walters, Texas to learn the rules and standards and how to fly helicopters. But then they put him in the Infantry.

He said "If I could do it all over again, I would've taken the flight program more seriously." He said he was a cocky little snot-nosed kid when he went in the military.

His advice for a person going into the military is to do it 110%, give it everything you've got and be dedicated. It can be very difficult and very lonely at times. The service takes you to strange places but at the same time it's a wonderful experience.

The 101st Airborne in Vietnam were the best trained; they liked to stick their noses in beehives.

He left the Army in 1971 as rank E4. After he got out, he went to college. He did suffer from PTSD, and one Saturday night in 1975 his brother was killed in a car accident. He and his parents had a hard time dealing with his loss. This was during the Carter Administration, when there were no jobs, so he reenlisted in the Navy in September 1975 to September 1978.

His first cruise was to WestPac, the Philippines and Vietnam. He worked on the flight deck on aircraft carriers. He left the Navy as an E5, which offered him a college opportunity at the Art Center College of Design in Pasadena.

Gary studied as an Artist/Illustrator. The Navy paid for all four years in college, which would today cost \$50,000 a year for three semesters and that's just tuition. He then went on to work for McDonnell Douglas.

Gary received a special award from a two-star General. It was for 101st Airborne Air Assault Veterans, Battle of Fire Support Base Ripcord. This was a 23-day battle in July 1970 between elements of the 101st Airborne and two reinforced divisions of the North Vietnamese Army.

Gary said the Army was very structured and the Navy was more fun. The Navy permitted us to work with creativity, teaching us to find a quicker safer way to get the job done. There was lots of young guys that were fun to work with and teach them new things.

His thoughts on AVAG:

He was very happy to be introduced to us by David and Mellissa Breunig of the Richard Breunig Foundation. He appreciates organizations like ours who work tirelessly to help veterans. Without people like AVAG so many people would suffer, he loves organizations like ours.

Gary said, "A veteran to me is a brotherhood, we all raised our right hand to serve and protect our country."







AVAG Repairs a Pacific Palms Veteran's Home

AVAG is honored to help with home repairs and rent assistance for this war hero — another amazing home transformation. He's a great asset to the community; always looking out for everyone. Veteran Joe DuBois from Pacific Palms needed the stairs and shed fixed. See the before and after pictures showing the repairs below.

Meet Joe DuBois

Joe DuBois served in the Navy from 1964-1979. Joe completed basic training in San Diego and Navy Seal training in West Virginia. He was stationed in Vietnam and also served in Korea.

"If I had to do it all over again I would, because it's my country and I wouldn't change a thing. I was a young man when I joined and worked my way up." The highest rank Joe received was Master Chief E9, which was the top highest enlisted recruit.

"What I liked the most during my service was showing the new recruits how to do it the right way. I was able to train them what not to do and not make mistakes because when I first started, I made mistakes but I learned from them so they didn't have to.

"When I got out, I joined the LAPD and worked there for 14 years. Being in the military helped me have certain skills needed when I was a police officer in North Hollywood.

"My transition to civilian life wasn't too bad, we all had to do a psych evaluation and all the normal checkups. I had PTSD, I would hear a Helicopter above my house and react as if I was still in Vietnam.

"I was in charge of over 4,000 people, and I didn't like anyone, and nobody liked me, but I took care of my men.

"Being in the Navy I got to see a lot, they said if you join the Navy, you'll see the world and that's exactly what I did. My favorite places were Spain and Germany, they were very welcoming and nice to us and one of the friendliest countries I've ever been too.

"When we were in Vietnam, we went to rescue a lot of our soldiers that had been captured and imprisoned for a long time. We found them in an underground prison where they were being kept. We beat the Vietcong and got our men out. I remember how sickly and skinny they were. We were scared to snap them in half when we carried them out. One of the men asked why it took us so long to rescue them, but at that time we had just gotten the order." *


















A San Bernardino Veteran's Home Repaired by AVAG

Mike Newminski was drafted into the Army on June 26, 1963 and served until March 26, 1965. He was stationed in Korea at Camp Casey.

Camp Casey is a U.S. military base in Dongducheon, South Korea, 40 miles north of Seoul, South Korea. Camp Casey was named in 1952 after Major Hugh Boyd Casey, who was killed in a plane crash near the camp site during the Korean War.

Mike was a truck driver and transported soldiers and ammunition and anything else the army told him to transport.

Mike has been part of our AVAG Sequoia San Bernardino Chapter since its inception. He reached out to us about needing home repairs inside and outside his home.

Last November, AVAG completed the much needed home repairs. His home had several areas in need of repair His bathroom really needed help. AVAG installed a new shower. Flooring in both the bathroom and kitchen were replaced. New skirting for the outside was installed and him home was painted.





Elvia Huizar's Story:

I met with the USMC recruiter, Sgt Fletcher. We chatted that day, and I even got the opportunity to view their Boot Camp video. That was when I stood up, walked out of that office, and decided to become the World's Greatest United States Airman. I walked into the recruiting office next door and enlisted in the US Air Force

Amazing times in service; all of it, actually. My favorite subject in school was history. After being stationed in Germany; Spangdahlem Air Base, I joined their Base Honor Guard Team and was blessed with the opportunities to travel with them throughout Europe.

I performed in military ceremonies in places like where they had the Battle of the Bulge and General Patton's gravesite - places I read about and did essay papers about for history classes.

I miss the camaraderie, that's for sure, of the people I served with.

Being a single mother has definitely been very hard. I first became a single mother at the age of 14. My parents were not very forgiving of that, but they did help me out a lot,

with my first daughter. I was expected to keep my grades in school up. A B-average was the expectation and college bound. I had to beat the "Hispanic teen mom" statistic for my parents. I had made a mistake, and they were going to help me out, as long as I succeeded. In return, for them and my baby, and I did.

No more kids after that, unless I was married. Anyhow, after being discharged from the military, I was told by several different doctors at the VA that I would not be able to have any more kids. This was due to the amount of exposure that I had with radiation, burn pits, depleted uranium, and other technologies during my deployment.

Fast forward again...

My oldest turns 18 and I find out a few months later that I am pregnant. It was a toughie, high risk pregnancy. Oh my, all in all, I believe GOD had a huge part in my pregnancy. That is why I named my baby, Desti'Nee Faith. I got married shortly after she was born. Unbeknownst to me there was a lot of turmoil waiting for me. I experienced domestic abuse. I had ankle surgery and was bound to a wheelchair for over a year. I had to learn how to walk all over again, and with a baby.

Shortly after, I find out that the \$40,000 I had saved up from my military service, and my last deployment was all gone. With this money I had planned to purchase my very own first house. In a matter of just 3 years, my husband had wiped me out completely and left me with a negative \$700 balance in my account.

When I confronted him about this, he admitted to it and then went missing for days. In those days, our rent became overdue, and I had 3 days to move everything out of our 2-bedroom apartment in Corona. I did this with a baby and a cast on my foot. He was nowhere to be found. I had no money for even a box to pack my belongings in.

I wasn't working due to my surgery and disability would not cover my rent, milk, diapers, and a car payment. I packed my and the baby's stuff in trash bags and put my stuff into storage. My parents had no room in their home, so I slept in my car with a 1.5-year-old. I was recovering from ankle surgery with my baby and no one to help me.

Section 8 had a year's wait list and HUD VASH said I made too much money from my VA rating of 80%. Now, I will tell you this, just because one has "recovered from homelessness" that does NOT automatically mean that everything is now perfect and better.

We recovered from homelessness April 2019 but were still struggling.

AVAG was able to present Elva with a Quilt of Valor that had an animal print and she told us that's how she felt when she was homeless, she went into survival mode. We also were able to give her a La-Z-Boy recliner for her new apartment. She is working at Disneyland now and getting on the right track.

On December 22, 2021, we partnered with Flagman Frank to sponsor Elvia and her daughter for Christmas and other AVAG veteran families. X





This is when you see Veterans in action helping others. How amazing to give back to so many families in need right now and bringing Christmas joy to so many kids. *






































Santiago Orangewood Estates Toy Delivery

Robert Anderson Brown

"I enlisted at 19. I was just getting out of high school and my buddy and I decided to join the Navy. I served in the Navy from 1965-1967 in Vietnam. I was on the USS Eversole DD789 off the Tonkin Gulf in Vietnam. We were the gun fire support, we sat about 1.5 miles off shore and shot chemicals to shore to get rid of the Vietcong that were on land still, and some that were hiding underground, in order to help our ground troops. We fired 24/7 and I stayed on the ship the whole time for support. The highest rank I got was an E3. I was a gunner's mate. This was hush hush, but we had nuclear weapons on the USS Eversole in Vietnam. We never used them, but we always had them ready if we needed them. I remember seeing this huge box on board that barely gave you much room to walk by.

The best thing about my service was being at sea. I loved looking around and being the only ones out there, only seeing the ocean for miles. It was really cool to see the flying fish trying to keep up with the ship and hearing them flap it was the neatest thing. The worst thing was having to see some the things I did, all of the death and destruction, even just from the ship, you could still see everything."

Robert has been part of our AVAG group at Palm Vista since 2017. He and his wife, Jeanne, helped launch our first Bible Study. They would set up coffee and take care of all of our needs. Now they help with feeding the community and events. \$\times\$










Joe Bob Smith (Cowboy)
