Firefighters for Christ Help AVAG Provide Housing With Donated RVs

Ray Thompson, a retired LA County fire captain, involved with Firefighters for Christ was advised they had been given trailers by the City of Los Angeles used during the Coronavirus pandemic and were no longer needed. They were looking for needy people to give them to. When we told them we had both veteran and low-income people in need, they were elated. We coordinated the donations through our Christian ministry non-profit, Orange Christian Business Ministry (OCBM) and American Veterans Assistance Group (AVAG).

I received a call from Mr. Richard giving me the exciting news, and was asked if I would be able to find people that could use an RV. I didn't know what to expect. I just heard that they were in good condition. Paul Gomez took them over to Palm Vista in Hemet.

I called one of my amazing volunteers, Janice Castillo, who we do Bible study with every week, and I asked her if she could pray on something with me. We received some RVs to replace peoples old RVs in your park. I also asked her, "Do you know anyone, off-hand, espe-Continued on Page 2

cially Veterans that could use them?" I joke around with her all the time. I tell her she's the richest woman in the park, because it's not about the money, it's about all the compassion that she shows for her community. She started to share stories with me of different residents in the park, and and mentioned some in the park that could use an RV upgrade.

Some of them I knew from the weekly food giveaways and the veterans events we put on in this community, and some I did not know.

Everyone filled out their applications, and I submitted them for approval. After that I met up with each of the future recipients and showed them the RVs. This was the first time I looked at them, and I realized they were brand new. They were overjoyed and couldn't believe that this was going to happen. But, we had to get rid of the old RVs to put in the new ones. Charlie Corder and Richard King found someone that lived in the park to help them remove their old ones. Frank Brammer met a man named Larry Patke at the gas station, who told him "I'd be glad to help, that's what I do for a living." What an amazing guy that he would volunteer his time. Not only did he move Frank's old RV, but he also moved Dave Robinson's as well. It wasn't easy getting those 33-footers into the spaces in the 100-degree weather. It was exciting to hand them the keys and watch them as they walked inside and seeing that everything was brand new. Charlie just sat in his chair staring in disbelief.

About Michael Davis

Michael was born in Kansas and then moved to California with his family. During his marriage his wife asked him to go to seminary school. He got his degree, but didn't get picked up as a pastor. So, he went on to work at other jobs. He and his wife eventually divorced. After his kids were grown up, he started to take care of his mother. He and his niece took care of her until she passed away.

With his part of the inheritance, he bought a travel trailer RV. He would pull over and spend three days at a time at different locations until the police ran him off.

He became ill with cellulitis and wound up in the hospital with lesions and bacterial infections. He had to have major surgery on his spinal column. He spent eight months in the hospital.

Before his surgery he couldn't walk. A friend had to carry him on his back to get him into the car and into the doctor's office, a neurosurgeon. A physical therapist worked with him for seven months teaching him how to walk again.

While he was in the hospital, his motorhome was impounded. After leaving the hospital, he got a 1988 Coachman trailer. The trailer he has been living in is in poor condition. There is no electrical panel, electric wire shorts, the floor in the bathroom is soft due to a leaky bathtub, there's no carpeting, and no stairs to get into the house.

One of his friends, Sue Perry from Palm Vista, recommended that he receive a new RV donated to AVAG through Firefighters for Christ. AVAG agreed and he recently received one.

We also sent one to one of the Afghanistan refugees in Mojave.

It's exciting to know that they will have a nice place to sit, relax, have dinner, get a good nights sleep, have access to a working shower and toilet, be able to cook meals and have air conditioning.

It reminded me of the scripture Malachi 3:10:

"Test me in this," says the LORD Almighty, "and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it. I will prevent pests from devouring your crops, and the vines in your fields will not cast their fruit," says the LORD Almighty. ¥

His dad and uncle both served during WWII. His dad and uncle were both in the Army Air Corps.

Dave said the best part about the service was getting discharged and the worst was never getting paid enough. When he got out, he got married and lived all over the states. He worked as a construction worker, contractor and superintendent in the building industry.

After he and his wife divorced, he became Mr. Mom raising four kids on his own. Now he has a lot of grandkids and great grandkids that live all over.

He has now lived at Palm Vista for about three years. Dave was very surprised when AVAG approached him about receiving a new RV

Richard King grew up in San Bernardino, CA and now has lived in Hemet for 30 years. His family had originally moved there because back then it was a lot cleaner and had no graffiti. He figured there were no gangs but that's changed over the last 10 years.

He used to play guitar for living, from the age of 15 to 35 and then drove trucks. He started having seizures and couldn't drive anymore. Because of the seizures he hasn't worked for 17 years.

He was really surprised when AVAG offered him the new trailer. He was very shocked, and happy, never thinking something like this would happen. For a while, he was trying to save enough money to eventually put a down payment one a new trailer. He was never able to save enough as they were just too expensive.

For Richard this is a blessing. He is grateful from the bottom of his heart and is very appreciative to have been considered. He says that it's really nice. He had really given up faith on the world but this definitely helps make up for it, he never thought this would happen.

When he was 35 and recently divorced, he moved to Palm Vista and has lived there for about 22 years. Now with the new RV trailer he plans on living here another 22 years, he definitely is not planning on leaving any time soon. 🕊

Frank Brammer

Frank Brammer is an Army Veteran who served in the Korean War. He joined when he was 18 years old.

Frank originally grew up in Marshall, Missouri. His family moved to California, where his parents worked at the shipyard in San Pedro on the battleships. He has children but they're scattered across California, Montana and Oregon.

Frank said that he is a flag raising man. He started at age six or seven holding up the flag. He acknowledged that it's been a long time since he was in the military, but it breaks his heart to see this country being broken down. With tears in his eyes, he commented that this is the greatest country in the world. He would gladly serve his country all over again.

He remembers watching newsreels at the movie theaters when he was seven-years-old. They showed the horrible conditions in other countries. He knew then that there is no country like ours. He wants people to keep praying for our country. We are the land of the free because of the brave.

After he left the Army, he lived on a ranch until he broke his back in 1981. He fell on hard times and had to rent a room for a while.

A few years ago he met a lady who showed him kindness and allowed him to take her RV and make payments. Then began his life of living in motorhomes for over 40 years.

At 87, he never thought he would receive something like a brand-new RV. He has nothing but gratitude and praise. He has been having a hard time even sleeping because he can't believe that he received such a wonderful gift.

He has never received a gift of this magnitude in his whole life.

He also has a lot of gratitude and respect for one of amazing AVAG volunteers Janice Castillo who has been helping him during the move. At 87 years old it's hard to do a lot of things for yourself anymore.

This new RV is far more comfortable than his old one. It has air-conditioning, modern fixtures, plenty of storage, a shower and bathroom. He now has room when someone comes for a visit there's plenty of room.

He's been putting his things away in his new RV and is looking forward to purchasing a shed so he can put stuff in it to keep his area clean.

He is still asking why and how did this happen to me? He is one happy veteran. 🕊

"After I got out, they started sending the Army Reserves and National Guard over to Vietnam, so I got out just in time.


"For the most part I didn't really enjoy anything when I was in the service because it was during Vietnam. No one had even heard of it and all of a sudden, they started sending people over just to die.

"My favorite part about my service was during the summer. We would take two-weeks training, and this one time we went to Camp Roberts by Paso Robles, about 30 miles from Hunter Liggett. The only way to communicate was to hike through the hills to get service, and we would have a great time drinking beer together.

"AVAG did a beautiful job painting my home. The work they did is great, it looks good. I'm very, very happy. Thanks to those guys that helped get my trees out, and paint my house. I thought they would have a crew, but it was just one guy by himself. He was able to paint the whole house in one day. I'm 80 now, and I wouldn't have been able to do it myself, or even afford it, so thank you."

Jack is an amazing guy and it was an honor to help him with his home repair and tree removal. With our veterans being on a fixed income, it's great to be able to help them with rent assistance as well.
