AVAG Founder Receives the St. Philip Neri Award

Richard Simonian, AVAG founder and an original member of the US Army Special Forces Green Berets, was awarded the Medal of St. Philip Neri by the Special Forces Association. Here is some history regarding the honor.

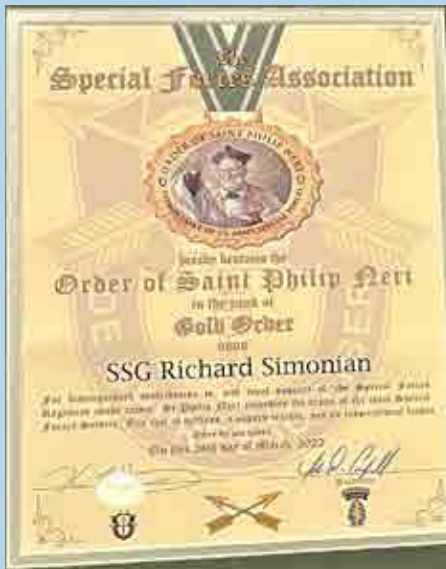
Why is Saint Philip Neri the patron saint of US Special Forces?

The St. Philip Neri Award Program was established by the United States Army Special Forces Command in 2002. St. Philip Neri was selected as the Patron Saint of Special Forces because he embodied the traits of the ideal Special Forces soldier: selfless, superb teacher, and inspirational leader.

St. Philip Neri was an Italian saint, and is best known as the founder of the secular order “The Congregation of the Oratory.” He was an important figure in the Counter-Reformation. Philip worked with the poor in Rome and had many followers in this area of work. Philip helped to revive Catholicism during the spread of Protestantism. St. Philip Neri truly knew how to carry out the Corporal Works of Mercy.

The Special Forces Association recognized that Richard is the true epitome of the “Quiet Professional.” He has helped literally thousands of Veterans and refugees since leaving the Army in the 1950s. Santiago Communities is made up of 1,500-plus affordable residence communities across the nation and has helped thousands of veterans with housing and a chance to get on their feet. In addition, he has committed to getting the Afghan commandos and interpreters safely out of the danger zone. He has created two communities, Mojave and Ridgecrest, where he has helped the members move in and get situated. While he has been helping others, he has never said a thing about his work and is recognized as a true Quiet Professional.

The Special Forces Association was proud to present this award to Richard. A name change to the Richard Simonian Chapter for Special Forces Association Chapter 78 is being considered. 🦋

AVAG and Hope Chapel Monthly Visit to the Veterans Hospital Long Beach Veteran Low Sight and Blind Rehabilitation Program

AVAG and Hope Chapel chaplains and volunteers visit the Veteran Low Sight and Blind Rehabilitation Program at the Veterans' Hospital in Long Beach once a month for dinner and after dinner companionship and activities.

This VA program, led by our activity liaison, Liz Greco, offers the following blind and low vision rehabilitation services for our Vets:

- Vision-enhancing devices and technologies (like electronic reading machines and electronic mobility devices) — and training in how to use them
- Training in new visual skills to help with everyday tasks (like reading, writing, cooking, managing your medicines, and locating and reading signs)
- Sensory training (training that helps Vets better use other senses, like hearing or touch)
- Mobility and orientation training (training that helps a Vet create mental maps that may help the veteran feel more confident as they move through the world)
- Strategies for restoring a veteran's ability to communicate through writing or using the computer
- Counseling and group therapy to help a veteran adjust to blindness
- Family-centered care that helps families of Vets learn how to support a veteran as they adjust to blindness

Desserts are enjoyed with our Veterans along with sweet company through conversations, prayer (if requested), art competitions, games, and music at these gatherings.

Our chaplain and volunteer team, whether onsite at the hospital or even at a local golf course, share their hearts and joyous times with sight-challenged Veterans. These photos on this page say it all. 🐦

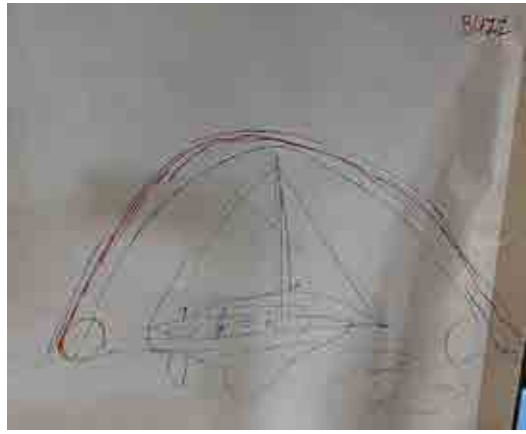

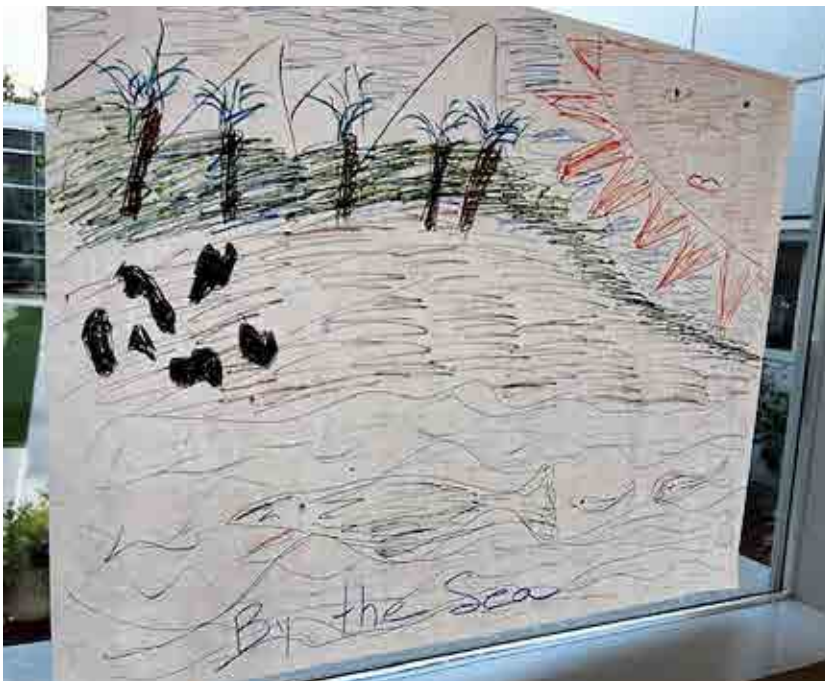

AVAG Chaplains and Volunteers Reach A Very Special Veteran Golf Community



As many of you know, our AVAG and Hope Chapel chaplains and volunteers serve our veterans in a variety of environments. Recently, one of our chaplains, Kathleen Rowden, who loves our veterans and enjoys golf, connected with an organization that her dad, Robert Schrader, an 80-year-old avid lifetime golfer and USAF retired Chief Master Sergeant Retired, has for years served with the Joe Grohman Golf Foundation (JGGF). The PGA Hope Golf Clinics are now teamed with the JGGF and host six-week adaptive golf clinics at various Southern California locations, as well as tournaments for golfers with various challenges. Some of the populations served at these wonderful clinics include our local VA Hospitals, Paralyzed Veterans of America, and the local veteran community.

The Joe Grohman Golf Foundation (JGGF) is a non-profit organization that uses golf as a rehabilitative outlet to instill a true sense of community, promote positive social interaction, regain lost confidence, renew focus, and redevelop physical and mental strengths.

JGGF accomplishes their goals by hosting weekly, monthly, and annual golf clinics and tournaments at various golf courses throughout the year. JGGF provides a golf venue and

luncheon, along with volunteers giving of their time, expertise and support.

JGGF feels it is their duty to give back to those who have given so much and to those from whom much has been taken. They also base their foundation efforts on the proven fact that hospital patients are known to recover quicker when exposed to pleasant landscape views, physical activity, and positive social interaction.

PGA HOPE | PGA HOPE (Helping Our Patriots Everywhere) is the flagship military program of PGA REACH, the charitable foundation of the PGA of America. This program is open to all Active Duty, Reserve, National Guard, and Veterans. This program is provided at no cost to the Veteran. Veterans can range from World War II-era to post-9/11-era Veterans to those newly separated from the military. PGA HOPE also introduces golf to Veterans with disabilities to enhance their physical, mental, social, and emotional well-being.

The program introduces the game of golf through a developmental 6-to-8-week curriculum taught by PGA Professionals trained in adaptive golf and military cultural competency. All programs are funded by PGA



REACH and supplemented by PGA Section Foundations, so the cost of programming is free to all Veterans and Active Duty.

Chaplain Kathleen and her dad, Robert Schrader, served at the last series of six-week clinics at Old Ranch Golf Course in Seal Beach, California. Kathleen and her dad were accompanied in service by other volunteers from JGGF, golf professionals, PGA-Southern Section, Old Ranch Golf Course workers, Long Beach Veterans Hospital bus drivers, and rehabilitation professionals at these clinics.

At the end of the clinic, there is a graduation celebration. Chaplain Kathleen arranged a raffle, raffle prizes, and additional volunteers, including her sister Maureen, a former professional golfer, and AVAG's Chaplains Doreen and Amanda to participate. SoCal Quilts of Valor (QOV), a nonprofit foundation whose mission is to provide a Quilt of Valor to all active-duty military and veterans. Southern California Quilt of Valor donated many quilts for our golf veterans to choose from. Approximately, 8-10 Veterans were honored and presented with "Quilts of Valor" for their military service at the golf event. 🦋





Larry Schneider, Golf Vet

From 1964 until 1968, Larry served in the Marine Corps. In Quantico, Virginia, he completed his basic training before moving on to the New River air facility near Camp Lejeune. From there, he was assigned to a Marine Corps Air Base in Vietnam. He was put in charge of the control tower, where he would keep an eye on the radar, track the plane traffic, and ensure that the airfield was clear. Larry spent 13 months stationed in Vietnam. He was given the Captain title as the highest rank.

The job he was performing and the camaraderie with the other service members were the best parts of serving. The hardest part was that he couldn't ever get warm or dry while he was in Vietnam during the rainy season. No matter what he did, he was constantly damp. The beach was just 200 yards away from where he was stationed in Vietnam, and the water there was like bath water.

He had no problems transitioning back to civilian life. Larry said, "We all thought we were doing the right thing being in Vietnam, even though everyone back home was protesting against our involvement."

His last assignment was at the El Toro Marine Corps Air Station, where he ran all of the air operations. For example, when President Nixon would fly in, he had to be up in the control tower to make sure all operations were ran smoothly.

For R&R, he went to Hong Kong and Bangkok for a week. During that week, Larry and his buddies hired a cab driver. He was great; if they woke up at 1 a.m., he would pick them up and drive them wherever they desired. On their last night, they took him to the only place that served pizza for dinner. The look on his face was priceless because he had never had pizza before and wasn't sure what it was or how to even eat it. They couldn't tell if he liked it or not. It was really funny; he was a great guy.

Larry has always been into golf; he was a good player even before he joined the Marine Corps. After leaving the service, he worked in finance and banking. He felt he couldn't advance very far there, so when he was around 39 or 40 years old, he got more into the golf business. He ended up at the Anaheim Hills Golf Course and started instructing at the pro shop. Eventually he was running the whole golf course. 🦋

SGM (E-9) Bruce Dale Long United States Army Retired 32 years of dedicated service

May 17, 1942 – September 14, 2022

We have said a final goodbye to our friend, Bruce Dale Long, who passed away on September 14, 2022, at the age of 80, surrounded by family and friends at his home in Corona, California. His battle with cancer over the past couple of years showed his courage in facing life's challenges with a smile and determination. Despite the pain, Bruce came out as our hero and stayed strong until the very end.

In 1961, he wanted to serve his country and so he joined the United States Army, serving in Vietnam. After attending jump school, Bruce was assigned to 82nd Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, NC, from 1962– 1964, and was then part of the 173rd Airborne Brigade, Vietnam, 1966–1967. From 1968–1969, he was assigned to the 46th Special Forces Company (Airborne), 1st Special Forces, Thailand.

In 1969, Bruce received an honorary discharge and continued serving his community by joining the Westminster Police Department. While serving on the Westminster Police Department, he completed his Bachelor of Arts with a Major in Criminal Justice at California State University Fullerton, and he went on to earn his Master of Arts at Pepperdine University. Bruce rose to the rank of detective, and became a member of their SWAT team, attending the FBI Training Academy in Quantico, VA.

Bruce joined the United States Army Reserve in 1977 and served with the 12th and 19th Special Forces Groups, retiring in 2001 as Sergeant Major with 32 years of dedicated service to the United States Army and Special Forces.

Sergeant Major Bruce Long joined the Special Forces Chapter 12 and served as Chapter President from 2006 to 2008. He then joined the Special Forces Chapter 78 in 2012 and served as Chapter President from 2014–2017 and again from 2020–2021 for a total of three terms. 🦋

He also showed up to our first Veterans Connect in July 2022, where he shared important information regarding suicide prevention for veterans.

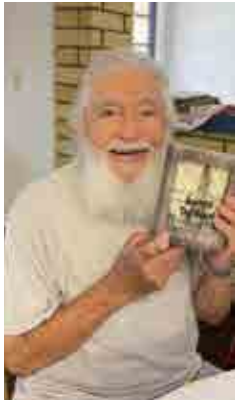
In his last days, I was able to visit him at his home, and I asked him, "What are you going to say to Jesus when you see him?"
