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Meet Catherine Barrett

My name is Catherine Barrett. Almost my entire life has been in and around the United States Army. My father served 20 years of active duty. He was stationed in Germany where he met and married my mother. I grew up an "Army Brat," and it was a great childhood. Then I joined the Army when I was 20 years old and served a total of 26 years; 23 Active Duty and 3 Army Reserve. My activeduty career consisted of three years of Regular Army and 20 years as AGR-Active Guard Reserve. I started as a 71L (Admin Specialist), and later as a 75B (Personnel Sergeant). I was able to help many soldiers get promoted and get awards. I took pride in keeping excellent personnel records and was once voted to have the best kept records in the 96th ARCOM (Army Command).

I served in various positions and units and slowly worked my way up in rank. I was active duty during both Gulf wars, but I didn't deploy until the second one. At that time, I was an Assistant Inspector General, and I volunteered for deployment ending up at Camp Arifjan, Kuwait working for Central Command's Inspector General Office. I worked with many young soldiers and was able to counsel and guide them when they came to IG Office.

One of the most rewarding things I did while in Kuwait was help get a child pornographer arrested. I was walking to the dining facility while in Kuwait and found a USB drive in the sand. We had just received a briefing on keeping classified documents off our personal drives, and in my mind I was thinking, "Ha! This drive has classified material on it and I'm going to find out who it belongs to and expose them!" Not really, I would just have returned it to them, with a warning if it had classified documents on it. When I looked at the drive on my computer, turns out it was full of child pornography. I turned it over to the CID (Criminal Investigation Division). I had never been so thoroughly fingerprinted in my life. Even when I first joined the Army. Long story short the CID found the man the USB belonged to and arrested him in Iraq. Turns out he was also wanted in Georgia for child pornography. One of the CID investigators I turned the drive over to had later been reassigned back to Georgia and was aware of the outcome of his case. He informed me that the guy pleaded guilty to international transportation of child pornography and was sentenced to federal prison.

While in Kuwait, I was privileged to go TDY to Djibouti, Africa. I truly believe that God was watching over me on that trip. My SGM and I started our trip on UAE airlines. Their economy class is as good as if not better than our first class. We changed planes in Dubai to an Ethiopian airline and landed in Djibouti. We were there to check on soldiers stationed there and offer our IG services. Back at the airport to go back to Kuwait, our luggage was confiscated and held hostage until we paid them a tip. The plane took off but turned around 20 minutes later back to the airport. We were told there was some kind of trouble with the plane. We sat on the runway for an hour or so and were fed some food. Then, without any forewarning, the plane's engines started, and the plane took off! No fasten your seatbelts, no put away your food and tray tables, nothing! I believe it was God's good grace that allowed us to return to Kuwait safely.

One of the best things that happened to me in Kuwait was that I met my husband over there. We spent time together after work for about six months before he went back to the states. We kept in touch and four months after he left, I redeployed back to



the states. I retired and moved down to North Carolina, where he was stationed at Fort Bragg, and we were married. We just celebrated 17 years of marriage.

I enjoyed my career in the Army because it gave me purpose and structure in my life. I was serving my country, and the Army gave me discipline. I enjoyed the camaraderie of my fellow soldiers, especially other women soldiers, and I miss that to this day. I still keep in touch with some of the women friends I made while in the service. I was a single mom to one daughter for most of my career, and the Army gave me a steady job and paycheck that allowed me to take care of my daughter and send not only her to college, but also myself.

There really isn't anything I did not like about the Army. I was physically fit and passed my PT tests, but physical exercise is not my favorite thing. I didn't really care for early morning PT formations, or road marching, but it did keep me fit.

The most striking change in my life now is that along with my husband, I am fully committed to God, attend church regularly, read my Bible, and pray daily. I'm retired and get to spend time with my grandchildren. I'm working with them and their parents to lead them to Jesus as their Lord and Savior. I hope I have at least laid a foundation for them that they will remember when they are older and return to God if they stray. (Funny story, parents staying in bed while they made my sister and me get up and walk to church on Sundays.)

I now volunteer with Doreen and AVAG to assist veterans with submitting their VA claims. After a sermon from my pastor about completing Jesus's command to bring others to Christ, the Holy Spirit convicted me that working with Doreen would be my ministry. In addition to helping veterans with claims, I pray with them, some who don't even believe, and encourage them about Christ. 🕊

Reflections from Navy Veteran Jason Murchison

A featured speech from the AVAG & Cottonwood **Church Annual Veterans Day Celebration**

I'd like to welcome all of you in attendance today and thank you first of all for your service to this great country. I am here today as a witness to share my story in the United States Navy and, more importantly, how God has guided me through my time in the military and the love he has shown me throughout this challenging time. My name is Jason Murchison. I am just a common man with an uncommon desire to succeed. I have been tested in ways I never thought possible, only to come out of my trials and tribulations as a stronger, more focused, and humbled individual. I come from a family that has a military history that dates all the way back to the Revolutionary War in this country. My grandfather, John, was a Navy Seabee chief who had a career that spanned from 2 weeks after the bombing of Pearl Harbor all the way through tours in Vietnam in the 1970s. My grandfather, Ken, was a Marine who had combat tours in Korea, and my step-grandfather, Frank, was also a Marine who was in a supply unit in Okinawa. These men told me stories as a child of their experiences, and this greatly shaped how I perceived the military; it sounded like a great adventure filled with sacrifice. I never dreamed I would follow in their footsteps, as the only thing I was focused on was school and surfing.

However, after attending my brother's graduation from basic training at Fort Benning, Georgia, and his receiving his blue cord for being in the Army's infantry, something changed inside me. I saw my brother do something I never thought he would do...he changed. No longer a lost man, he was part of something bigger...something more selfless. My brother and I were also very competitive, and if he was to do something like this... well, then I must do something that in my eyes will be even better. So I began researching what I would do in the military, and the only thing that ever interested me was being in the water. I also had been taught to shoot at an early age by my father, as he was a member of the Los Angeles County SWAT team known as SEB. As a child, I was brought to many demonstrations to watch how to clear rooms with a team of operators, watched them flash-bang these rooms with precision, and take out simulated terrorists while saving mock hostages. This "shoot house" experience always resonated with me, as there was more excitement in this scenario than I had ever seen before in any part of life. So I decided to follow in my family's line of service and join an elite unit within the US Navy.... I enlisted to become a US Navy SEAL.

The first school you go through in this great odyssey is Basic Underwater Demolition school, known as BUD/S... It is a sobering experience. No TV show, movie, documentary, or book can do it any justice or truly explain the amount of physical and mental adversity you go through. But everyone there is there of their own free will...we all volunteered for this, and please do not feel sorry for anyone there. BUD/S was an all-day, every-day-and-night wake-up call to being a man. There were people from all over the country, and everyone had a different background. But the common goal was there...to be part of the "Teams." Every man there wanted to be a team guy...part of something bigger. I wanted that so bad... that it had become the only



thing I thought about, cared about, and I put it above everything. The SEAL teams have an ethos...it speaks of the importance of the team itself, and these lines became how I saw the world.

"I will never quit. I persevere and thrive on adversity. My Nation expects me to be physically harder and mentally stronger than my enemies. If knocked down, I will get back up every time. I will draw on every remaining ounce of strength to protect my teammates and to accomplish our mission."

I am never out of the fight."

These were sacred words to me... I was beginning to lose myself and my walk with the Lord. I worshiped the teams and the instructors who were the gatekeepers to being a SEAL. I was about to find out how truly cruel and sadistic these men were... I was now part of a piratical culture that was a cult and one that did not have God as its focus. I thought I was there to train to kill terrorists and hunt them down in the darkest of nights. The thought of going to war was the only thing I prayed for... My heart turned hard as my body was becoming forged like iron in the training I was undergoing. I could swim, run, climb, and sneak around in the dark... I wanted to make martyrs of the men who opposed my country or anyone who got in my way. The world I was living in was not something that was sustainable, and the Lord saved me from it... ¥

I was a member of BUD/S class 287, and that means that 286 other brave classes had gone before me. It was a winter class that started in January. The water was 50 degrees on a daily basis, and you were cold, wet, sandy, and starving on a daily basis. I thought this was paradise at the time... This helmet you see in front of me held so much power at the time, as it symbolizes just one man in the group of almost 300. Every day, it was inspected by instructors and checked for imperfections, as it had to be polished and free from rust on the chin straps. At certain times it was dragged across the blacktop of the grinder by an instructor as a way to discourage you, as you had to spend time that night putting a new coat of varnish on it. If you ever decided you had had enough of training, you put this helmet down by the instructors' office and ring a big brass bell 3 times to signal that you had quit. The fear of quitting was so immense for most people that it could drive you to tears or madness. I knew in my heart I would never quit... So every day I would wake up on my quest to earn the golden trident you eventually are awarded when you complete SEAL training.

To get there, you would go through a slew of physical exercises known as "evolutions," where you and a team of other SEAL candidates would be timed on runs, swims, obstacle courses, or paddling a small rubber inflatable boat over huge breaking waves. This everyday competition was amazing because you would see other physically imposing guys decide to quit and leave their helmets and ring the bell. I began to take joy in watching others leave, as they did not have the same desire I had, and I thought only the best remained. This helmet became a symbol of my strength and resolve, but it was also a false idol. As the days of training turned into weeks, I thought everything would be fine, but in my foolishness, I had begun to create enemies with my attitude and started to gain the attention of the instructor staff. One fateful night, we were conducting a training exercise that resulted in a physical altercation between me and one of the senior SEAL instructors....

I entered the Navy thinking I would do this job until the day I died. However, I was quickly sent to a different unit and was never a combatant of war... I sat on the sidelines and watched my brothers go out and live out what I thought was my dream. A dream of false glory on a battlefield...a dream my ego invented.

The Lord had humbled me like I had never been humbled before... all these years of training would never be put to use. I struggled with this for a decade once I was out of the Navy. I did not realize it at the time, but the Lord had better plans for me...ones that included life and not death on a battlefield. I thought my purpose was to die for my teammates in war. I thought John 15:13 was the greatest verse in the Bible, where it was said that "There is no greater love than to lay down one's life for one's friends." So I wandered for years after the Navy, thinking a higher education would help. Thinking that starting a business would fill that hole.

But I was blessed in another way, as an old buddy of mine in training would visit me periodically. His name was Paul; he was my swim buddy in BUD/S. He was a believer and still operational with the SEAL teams. He had a stronger walk with the Lord than me, and I used to look down on him in training as someone who was weak... But one day, he introduced me to a woman he had met, and this woman ended up becoming my fiancé, and she first bore me a girl whom we named Kezia. This name has biblical significance, as it was one of the daughters God blessed Job with after he was restored from his trials and tribulations. I found it only fitting to name her this after my own trials.

I was then blessed with another child...a boy named Ford. He was born on one of the most significant days the world has ever seen. He was born on June 6th... D-Day: a day that the Western world decided to stand up against tyranny and embark on freeing Europe from evil. On this day, my son was born, there were two earthquakes, and the Lord showed himself to me, and I was in awe of his glory. As I now know that all the glory in this world is to be given to God. I was then baptized after my son's birth on June 30th to show my commitment to the Lord for saving me from my previous life. His gift to all of us is eternal life. So I now live my life for Him.

I was fortunate enough to find a church to bring my young family to attend, and the Lord has been with us every step of the way. This church, Hope Chapel in Huntington Beach, also has a veterans group that meets on the last Saturday of every month, so I started to attend that as well.

Here I was able to meet veterans that spanned from a gentleman who was part of the fabled 10th Mountain Division in World War 2 (who happens to be 100 years old and a pillar of faith). To other vets that were in Vietnam who shared similar experiences with my grandfathers. These men are all heroes...you men and women veterans out in the audience today are all heroes. It doesn't matter what branch

you were in or what your job was in the military...because you are all equally important. From combat veteran to cook...what you did made a difference. I salute each and every one of you...and to the spouses and families of these individuals, your sacrifice and support of these men and women was just as important...as they could not have done it without your love, support, and understanding.

We all gave so much... Do not ever minimize that. I was a member of Naval Special Warfare for a brief moment, but as Psalm 39:5 tells us, life is...

"No longer than the width of my hand. My entire lifetime is just a moment to you; at best, each of us is but a breath."

Meaning our time here is short, brothers and sisters; we should not waste it on foolish things but come to the Lord and ask him to guide us... Take refuge in the Lord, as he will save us. As it took me many trials and tribulations to become aware of this... I saw the power of the Lord, and he directed me away from evil and death. He gave me a family I never thought I would have... I thought my fate was to die. However, my purpose is to live with the Lord forever, and so is yours.

So if today my story and the Lord's love have affected you, please say this prayer with me.... "Dear Lord, please forgive me... I want to know you better. Show me your love. Help me change. Soften my heart and let me let go of any hate. Heal the pain in my mind. Let me focus on your goodness. I want to dwell in your house forever." 🕊



Southern California Quilts of Valor recently honored Pedro Aguirre, an Air Force and Vietnam War veteran (1965-1969). His future sonin-law, Frank Sanchez Sr., requested a surprise Quilt of Valor presentation. The family was present on the day of the presentation.

Meet Pedro Aguirre

Pedro served in the U.S. Air Force from 1965 to 1969. He was deployed to Vietnam from January 1967 to August 1968. His primary location while in Vietnam was Tan Son Nhut Airbase with the Military Assistance Command Vietnam (MACV). During his time in Vietnam, he worked with the delivery of the mail, ammunition, and medical supplies in C-123 and C-130 aircraft to other U.S. airbases.

He told the story of how one day, while working on an airbase, he heard his name being called out. When he turned to see who was calling him, he recognized an uncle who happened to be passing through the same base. What are the odds of such a chance encounter?

Pedro liked being in the Air Force and traveled to Taiwan and Bangkok. At the end of his enlistment, Pedro had considered reenlistment but found out that his next deployment was scheduled to be to Greenland. With this knowledge, he opted for discharge as a Senior Airman E-4. *

I proudly served in the United States Air Force from March 1980 to March 1992, attaining the rank of Technical Sergeant (E-6). My career began at Norton Air Force Base in San Bernardino, California, where I was trained and served as a C-141A/B Instructor Loadmaster and TALCE Loadmaster. In this role, I was responsible for critical air-

crew operations, including cargo transport, weight and balance, and inflight emergency procedures.

As part of the Tactical Airlift Control Element (TALCE), I deployed to Army, Navy, and Marine bases, where I managed remote airfield operations and joint-service personnel in support of military aircraft cargo load planning. I coordinated the deployment of aircraft, cargo, and personnel worldwide, reporting directly to the Air Force Military Airlift Command at Scott AFB.

Throughout my 12 years of active service, I accumulated more than 3,300 flight hours, performing numerous successful airdrops using C-141 A/B aerial delivery systems. My assignments gave me the privilege of working alongside fellow servicemen and women across the globe and taught me the importance of leadership, precision, and teamwork under demanding conditions. ¥


